

Master of Science in Nursing Nursing Education – Post-Master’s Certificate (World Wide Web)

Concentration Description

Nurses with a master of science in nursing degree may complete the nursing education concentration courses to earn a post-master’s certificate. Applicants for the post-master’s certificate complete a certificate application for ECU Graduate School and are not required to provide GRE or MAT scores. Minimum hours for completion of this certificate are 13 semester hours.

Requirements for Admission

Admission requires the student to meet the minimum admission requirements for graduate study of the university and the following requirements of the College of Nursing:

- A master of science degree in nursing from an accredited program
- Current non-restricted license to practice as a registered nurse (RN) in North Carolina or an NCSBN-compact state. (Individual advisement will be necessary for licensure regulations for online out-of-state students.)
- A course in statistics with a grade of “C” or higher
- A statement of purpose essay describing the applicant’s interest in graduate study, career goals and the certificate’s relationship to those goals
- Three professional references
- A personal or telephone interview with a member of the graduate faculty

The concentration director will review the post-masters certificate student’s transcripts and professional experiences in comparison to the program requirements to determine the appropriate plan of study for the individual student. All student transcripts will be reviewed for evidence of a graduate level clinical course. If one does not exist, the student will be required to take NURS 6208 (*Concepts of Health Promotion and Disease Prevention for Advanced Nursing Practice*) to meet the requirement. All post-masters certificate students will be required to complete a terminal program assessment as advised by the concentration director in the final semester.

Requirements for Clinical Courses

Information regarding clinical requirements can be found in the ECU College of Nursing Student Handbook at: www.ecu.edu/cs-dhs/nursing/customcf/downloads/handbooks/grad_handbook.pdf Upon admission all graduate students are required to complete a criminal background check. Students will receive specific instructions from the Office of Student Services on how to complete this process. The concentration director will review the post-master’s certificate student’s transcripts to determine the appropriate plan of study for the individual student.

Upon completion of the Nursing Education Post-Master’s Certificate the student will meet the education requirements to sit for the NLN certified Nurse Educator (CNE) examination.

*Students who have had substantial teaching experience may be exempt from NURS 6905 and take NURS 6908 Nursing Education Role II instead. This is a director decision.

**Students who completed NURS 6993 to earn a previous Master of Science in Nursing degree from ECU will satisfy this requirement by taking NURS 6500, Independent Study (1sh), to demonstrate professional competencies of the certificate program.

Requirements for Graduation

- All graduate students are required to maintain a grade average of “B.”
- Graduation application must be submitted at least one semester prior to completing the degree requirements as stated in the graduate catalog.
- Students who do not register for courses for a semester must complete an electronic readmission form (available at www.ecu.edu/gradschool/ and in the Graduate School Office).
- Students are required to keep graduate program/health requirements and liability insurance requirements up to date throughout their clinical courses.
- All post-master’s certificate students will be required to complete a terminal program assessment as advised by the concentration director in the final semester.
