Uniform Articulation Agreement between UNC-System RN to BSN Programs and NCCC-System Associate Degree Nursing Programs

The following presents a uniform, statewide academic progression agreement that will promote educational advancement opportunities for registered nurses moving between North Carolina community colleges and the constituent institutions of The University of North Carolina in order to complete BSN degrees. To be eligible for transfer credits, students must enter a North Carolina community college associate degree nursing program fall 2015 or later, and complete the curriculum as noted in the Uniform Articulation Agreement (outlined below).

¹Individual nursing programs may require a maximum of 2 courses or 6 credits to meet school specific degree requirements that are not part of the RN to BSN AA. In no case will these additional requirements necessitate completing more than 128 credits in order to earn a BSN. ECU does not require courses beyond those reflected in the RN to BSN Articulation Agreement.
