

Let the Poster do the Talking! Creating Effective Posters


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Purpose

Research Posters are used to:

- Exchange information between researchers and others
- Provide guidance for preparing a manuscript
- Draw attention quickly
- Contain the basics of the project presented
- Function in a stand-alone and/or accompanied session





Format

- Size is based on specifications set by conference organizers
- Size proportionally to design
- Maximum of five points or short sentences per section
- Organize from top to bottom, left to right, in three or four columns

Design


Techniques for design:

- Design may be controlled by conference organizer
- Landscape view is traditional poster format
- Utilize lighter colors for backgrounds and darker colors for emphasis
- Font sizes should be large in the title
- Font size should be smaller in the body of the poster

Content

- Content should be brief
- Include:
- Title
- Overview
- Background
- Objectives

- Body
- Conclusion
- Recommendations
- Acknowledgements



Example



Warning

- Respect copyright
- Ensure poster is readable at a distance of 4 feet
- Set the page size properly before beginning to design a poster
- More color equals greater cost
- Watch pixilation of pictures for adequacy and consistency

Conclusions

- Summarize the key points and objectives on the poster presentation
- Offers viewers opportunities to ask for more explanation and detail
- Make contact information available to viewers
- Provide business cards
- Provide handouts with greater detail on the topic
