

Master of Science in Nursing Neonatal Nurse Practitioner (World Wide Web)

Concentration Description

The neonatal nurse practitioner concentration prepares professional nurses to meet the needs of high-risk infants and their families in tertiary care centers. The 42-semester hour concentration includes core courses, clinical core courses, and concentration courses. All content courses are offered online and the clinical experiences are arranged in a geographically convenient area for the student. Students are required to travel to campus for one multi-day immersion experience.

Requirements for Admission

Admission to the master of science in nursing program requires the student to meet the minimum admission requirements for graduate study of the university and the following requirements of the College of Nursing:

- A baccalaureate degree in nursing from a regionally accredited nursing program
- A master of science degree in nursing from a regionally accredited program
- A minimum GPA of 2.7 in undergraduate studies and a minimum GPA of 3.0 in nursing major
- Two years of full-time clinical practice experience (within the last 5 years) as a registered nurse (RN) in the care of critically ill neonates or infants in critical care inpatient settings. **Students may enroll in preclinical courses while obtaining the necessary practice experience.**
- A professional resume or CV
- Current non-restricted license to practice as a registered nurse (RN) in North Carolina or in a NCSBN compact state. NNP students must have a license in the state they plan to do their clinical practice.
- Two professional references from an NNP or neonatologist. One reference must be from a health care provider knowledgeable about the applicant's current nursing practice.
- A statement of purpose essay describing the applicant's readiness for graduate school, career goals, and the relationship between readiness/goals and ECU's NNP program.

Requirements for Clinical Courses

Requirements for Graduation

- All graduate students are required to maintain a grade average of "B" in neonatal courses.
- Graduation application must be submitted at least one semester prior to completing the degree requirements as stated in the graduate catalog.
- Students who do not register for courses for a major (Fall/Spring) semester must complete an electronic readmission form (available at www.ecu.edu/gradschool/ and in the Graduate School Office). Readmission is not guaranteed.
- All graduate students complete a comprehensive assessment at the end of their program in NURS 6993.
- MSN students are required to keep graduate program/clinical compliance requirements current throughout their clinical courses.

Graduates are eligible to sit for the NCC national certification examination for NNP candidates.
